

“LET RIGHT BE DONE”

“To no one will we sell, to no one will we deny or delay right or justice” (s. 40, Magna Carta 1215).

“I,....., do swear that I will well and truly serve our Sovereign Lady, Queen Elizabeth the Second in the office of, and I will do right to all manner of people after the laws and usages of the State of New South Wales without fear or favour, affection or ill-will. So help me God.” (schedule 4, Judicial Oath, Oaths Act 1900 No.20)

CHALLENGING THE JURISDICTION of the Court is challenging the Oath (juris) spoken (diction) by the men and women inducted into the offices of the Court, ie: a Judge or a Juror.

A Judge is a state official with the power to adjudicate on disputes and other matters brought before the Courts when the consent of both parties has been given to be without a Jury .

A Judge swears to “do right” and asks God to help him perform that task, as does a Juror. Doing “right” is to be done “after the laws and usages of the state”, ie: the “laws and usages of the state” are to be known, the justice of them judged and the decision made as to whether they are appropriately applicable to the disputes and other matters brought before the Court. Doing “right” is to be done “without fear or favour, affection or ill-will”, ie: a Judge must not be frightened, but independent and impartial.

A Judge swears to “well and truly serve our Sovereign Lady, Queen Elizabeth the Second” who, by her Coronation, has sworn to “govern the Peoples of...Australia” and must be “ever mindful of the Law and the Gospel of God as the Rule for the whole life and government of Christian Princes”. She has received the “Sword of State” “that she may not bear the Sword in vain; but may use it as the Minister of God for the terror and punishment of evildoers, and for the protection and encouragement of those who do well, through Jesus Christ or Lord.”.

A Court is “a place where justice is administered” and Justice is “the protection of rights and the punishment of wrongs”. However, “evil counsellors, judges and ministers” are “endeavouring to subvert and extirpate the laws and liberties of the kingdom” as much today as when those words appeared in the Bill of Rights of 1688. Judges who have sworn the Judicial Oath are either evil, themselves, and have no intention to “do right”, or they are frightened by the evil ones to not “do right”.

Matthew 22: 35 – 40 says, “Then one of them, a lawyer, asked *Him a question*, testing Him, and saying, “Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law?” Jesus said to him, “You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and all your mind.” “This is *the* first and great commandment. “And *the* second is like it: “You shall love your neighbour as yourself.” “On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets.”
